## Finding a reason to smile

CFI helps one woman in her search for a happy, fulfilling life after a traumatic past.

Thirty-year old Elizabeth\* has spent most of her life desperately longing to experience simple moments many of us take for granted. Growing up, it was a longing for moments where she could feel the real, unconditional love of a parent or loved one. Today, she longs for a moment that simply makes her smile.

Born to an alcoholic mother, moments where Elizabeth was supposed to feel loved as a child were replaced by moments that left her feeling hurt and brokenhearted. Her mother, having grown up in an abusive and broken home, used alcohol as a form of self-medication and abused her own daughter emotionally, psychologically and physically. "She would yell and scream at me, throw lamps, pots-anything she could find," Elizabeth says.

When Elizabeth was 16, her mother sought help and became sober. Though the abuse ended and their relationship improved, the past never stopped haunting Elizabeth, and had already done significant long-term damage to her health. She developed problems such as Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder, Reactive Attachment Disorder and Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder, which cause severe anxiety and an unhealthy attachment to others. "I have yet to be independent," she says. "If I



go anywhere, Wal-Mart, the grocery store, I have to be with someone or I get extremely anxious." She struggles to hold a steady job due to trouble getting along with others, and has difficulty overcoming situations most people would not find overly stressful.

Though Elizabeth began seeing a psychiatrist ten years ago, medication did little to help. Her doctor suggested she begin seeing a therapist at Children & Families of lowa (CFI). She started therapy, but admits she wasn't willing to make a change in her life. During that time, she was involved in a relationship that was often physical and violent. Eventually, she stopped coming to sessions.

Shortly after, Elizabeth gave birth to her daughter, a life changing moment she will never forget, "That was the moment I experienced real, unconditional love for the first time," she says. For a while things seemed to be better, but the pain of the past returned. "I knew I needed to learn coping skills so I could talk about my issues and feel something, not just block it all out." Six months ago, Elizabeth decided to return to therapy. "I wanted to learn how to smile and feel it," she says.

Elizabeth's therapist works with her on meditation exercises where Elizabeth pictures a place she feels safe. "It has been really helpful because it brings me out of the bad place I am in, calms me and makes me feel safe," she says. "Thanks to CFI, for the first time in my life I feel like I am on the right track to overcoming my past. I'm finally starting to feel like a happy, self-sufficient life is possible and achievable for me, not only so I can have a better life, but more importantly so my daughter can."

Though Elizabeth's new journey toward healing has just begun, CFI has already given her hope for a brighter future.
